Starting Tomatoes and Peppers from Seed

Information compliments of Renee's Garden

When to Sow Seeds Indoors

Tomatoes and peppers need a long, warm growing period to set and ripen a good crop. Give plants a critical headstart by germinating and

growing seedlings in the warm indoors in early spring. Plan on setting out sturdy seedlings in the garden when temperatures stay in the mid-50°F range both day and night. Sow seeds six to eight weeks before that date normally arrives.

Getting Started

Your planting containers should be at least 3 inches deep, with small drainage holes. Use a good-quality seed-starting mix. Seed-starting mixes are sterile and blended to be light and porous, so your fragile seedlings get both the moisture and oxygen they need to thrive.

In a big bucket, add water slowly to the seedstarting mix and mix to the consistency of a wrung-out sponge. Fill each container to an inch below the top and tap on the tabletop to settle the mix. Make a seed furrow about 1/4-inch deep and drop in individual seeds about an inch apart. Sift more starting mix to fill the furrows and firm gently. Use a spray bottle to water the seeds with a fine mist.

Germinating and Growing

Both peppers and tomatoes need 80°F to 85°F conditions to start

germinating. Put the containers in a warm place where they'll get bottom heat, like on top of the water heater or refrigerator. Keep the container moist, but not soggy. Cover loosely with plastic to conserve moisture, and check daily to be sure they aren't drying out. Water with a very gentle spray of water. Expect germination in 5 to 10 days for tomatoes and 5 to 14 days for peppers.

As soon as any baby seedlings begin to emerge, remove any covering and provide a strong light source—grow lights, a fluorescent shop light or a south-facing window. If you use a sunny windowsill, rotate the plants every few days, so they don't have to reach for the light.

> Once germinated, seedlings will grow happily at 70°F to 80°F. Their first two oval "baby" leaves will soon be succeeded by sets

of true leaves. Check soil moisture by putting your index finger into the soil—if it's dry below your first joint, it's time to water carefully with a gentle trickle from faucet or watering can.

Potting Up

When seedlings are 2 to 3 inches tall and have several sets of true leaves, move them to deeper containers or individual pots. Fill containers with premoistened mix.

With the help of a fork thrust to the bottom, lift the seedlings gently, disturbing them as little as possible. If your plants are spindly, bury the stems right up to the topmost cluster of leaves, and new roots will grow along the buried stems. Gently press the mix around transplant and water to settle the soil.

Begin feeding your plants once a week using a good liquid fertilizer or

fish emulsion diluted to

half-strength. Give your seedlings as much light as possible and rotate regularly so they grow evenly.

Planting Seedlings in the Garden

In three or four weeks, or when the weather outdoors has warmed into the 50°F range at night, it's time to "harden off" your seedlings to outdoor conditions. Put them outside in a protected, shady spot for half a day at first, then for two or three full days, and then gradually move them into full sun, starting with mornings and then all day long. Plan to transplant into the garden in the late afternoon or on a cloudy day to minimize stress. Set them about 3 feet apart in the garden into rich, well-amended soil in full sun.

Tomato plants can be buried several inches deeper than they were planted in their containers. Firm the soil around the plants and water well. Set in stakes or cages for tall-growing tomatoes at planting time. Keep your young plants moist but not soggy. Mulch them with a good thick layer of compost, well-aged manure, straw or other organic material. This will provide the even moisture balance needed for healthy, disease-free growth and early, big fruit sets and will also discourage weeds.

In the Garden with Rick March Garden Tasks

In like a lion and out like a lamb? Or vice versa? It's usually a guessing game as to whether our rainy season is over by now or if March Madness wet weather will prevail. Regardless, there is plenty to do in the garden now to enjoy the upcoming spring months and longer days in your outdoor areas.

 Snails and slugs: Take care of snails and slugs that find their way into your garden and wreak havoc on plants.

✓ Spread compost:
 Spread compost over your garden and turn the soil.
 We offer 1.5 cu. ft. bags. (Sku 72436, \$4.99)

 Irrigation planning: If we're lucky, March will be a rainy month. But it is also a good time to think about upgrading your garden



irrigation system to water plants wisely during our dry season. Consider a drip system, soaker hoses or efficient sprinkler setup that distributes water effectively without wasting this precious resource.

✓ Divide and conquer: This is a great time to divide day lilies, hostas, daisies, chrysanthemums and lupines.

✓ Prune: After blooms have faded, prune your winter-flowering shrubs. Dormant plants and fruit trees should also be pruned. At the end of the month, prune fuchsias.

✓ Fertilize: When temperatures warm up, start fertilizing blooming and fruit plants with an allpurpose fertilizer, such as E.B. Stone. (Sku 745032, \$7.99) Roses can be fertilized when they begin to leaf out. Feed citrus trees with a high-nitrogen

fertilizer that includes iron, such as Citrus Tone (Sku 7208671, \$6.99) or E.B. Stone Citrus. (Sku 745030, \$6.99) An acid fertilizer should be used on camellias, rhododendrons and azaleas. We sell one from E.B. Stone (Sku 745033, \$7.99) or Miracid (Sku 7283781, \$5.49).



✓ Weed: Pull weeds before they have a chance to set deep roots. If weeds get the opportunity to seed, they will be more troublesome because they will have the opportunity to spread. It's easiest to pull weeds right after a rainstorm. ✓ Summer bulbs: Plantsummer bulbs including dahlias, lilies, gladiolus and begonias.

 Plant vegetables: Hardy seeds,

such as radishes, potatoes, spinach and turnips, can all be planted at this time.

✓ Annuals: With spring around the corner, you can begin planting annual flowers, including pansies, marigolds, poppies, primroses, calendulas and alyssum.

✓ Start seedlings indoors: Cardboard egg cartons make ideal seedling starters. Fill each cup with soil and a seed. Once your seedlings sprout, just cut apart the cups and plant—cup and all!



How to Make Taggers Stop Persistence in Removing Graffiti Has Its Rewards

Graffiti may seem like a never-ending battle. It seems like it may not be worth doing anything about it. But there is a solution for preventing

graffiti and tagging for walls and windows-a solution that works.

A Simple Solution

Ignoring the situation will never solve the problem. Letting it build up will only scare away your customers and cost you more in the long run. The secret to solving the problem is simple—keep removing the graffiti.

Remove the Reward

Vandals are rewarded by being able to observe their "artwork" on your walls or

Practice Bully Behavior Modification

By being quick in removing the graffiti, you practice behavior modification. The longer the damage remains on your walls or windows, the greater the chance that you will be hit multiple times.

When taggers realize that you will not tolerate your property being damaged, they will find

others who will not remove their "artwork," and they'll leave your property alone.

How to Remove Tags How to Remove Graffiti on Walls

Keep a can of paint and a paintbrush handy, so you can immediately paint over the damaged wall. With today's paint technology, you can easily match the wall color so that you don't have a "patchwork" look from using a not-quite-matched shade. Get the color matched exactly, and no one will know that there was tagging on your wall. With a small chip of paint,

approximately the size of a quarter, the paint department at all COLE HARDWARE locations can match your paint.

How to Remove Graffiti on Windows and Glass

Once glass is vandalized, you need to contact a glass restoration company. You cannot repair glass graffiti like you can wall graffiti. With glass graffiti, you have three choices: 1. Leave it alone. (Bad choice—it encourages even more.) 2. Replace it. (Bad

3. Repair and restore it. (Best choice—it's less than 50% of the cost to replace.)



PRODUCT KNOWLEDGE

If I Had a Hammer ...

Probably the oldest tool known to mankind, dating back over 2 million years, the venerable hammer has proven that it has staying power. It is arguably the most important and basic tool used on a daily basis. Although the materials used in the construction of a hammer have evolved over time, the basic design has not changed a whole heck of a lot. Function, durability and ease of use are the main qualities to consider when choosing a hammer.

Anatomy of a Hammer

Head: Hammer heads are commonly made of forged, heat-treated, high-grade steel. Mallets (technically part of the hammer family) have wooden, rubber or plastic heads.

Striking Face: These range from the smooth face most often found in multipurpose claw hammers, to the milled/checkered face of a framing hammer, which grips the nail head and reduces glancing blows. The double-faced dead blow (one face steel, the other rubber) and the massive hit-the-side-of-a-barn face of an engineer hammer or sledgehammer are other face variations.

Claw: Claw hammers are named after the two narrowing "claws" of steel opposite the striking face. The slot between these two claws looks like a thin "V" and is used to grip and pull nails. The two common types of nail hammers both have claws, but in different configurations. Curved claw hammers allow you to pull nails using an easy rocking motion, as the curve acts as a fulcrum. Straight claw hammers, commonly called rip hammers, are designed to rip apart nailed structures.

Handle: The stiffer the handle material, the more the force of your blow will be delivered directly to its target. However, more flexible materials absorb shock and thus reduce stress on the user's hand, wrist and arm. Most folks who hammer a lot prefer wooden (usually select hickory) handles for their superior shock absorption. Stiffer handles such as fiberglass, steel or graphite are commonly jacketed with a

Hammer Types

Hammers come in many different shapes and forms. Cole Hardware offers a variety of all of these styles of hammers, and if you require a specialty hammer that isn't in stock, we can special order it for you.

Nail Hammer: Used for general carpentry, household chores and nail pulling; should be used only with nonhardened, common or finishing nails. A curved claw offers leverage in removing nails and can also cradle a two-by-four.

Rip Hammer: Used mainly by professionals for ripping apart wooden components and demolition work. These are available with milled or waffled faces to grip the nail head and reduce the effect of glancing blows and flying nails.

Finishing Hammer: Used for general carpentry, finishing and cabinet making; smooth striking face so errant strikes don't leave marks on wood.

Tack Hammer: Used for furniture upholsterv and to drive small nails and tacks. The round face is designed to pick up nails and tacks, while the narrow square head is used to drive them. These often come with a magnetized head.

Ball-Peen Hammer: Used with cold chisels for riveting, center punching and forming unhardened metal work. They are designed with a regular striking face on one end and rounded or half-ball on the opposite end instead of a claw.

Sledgehammer: Used for jobs where great force is required such as breaking up concrete or driving heavy spikes. Double-face sledgehammers feature two identical faces; single-face sledgehammers have one flat face for striking and one wedge-shaped face for splitting wood

Hand Drilling Hammer: Has short handles and is used for pounding hardened nails into concrete or for using with tools that drive nails and pins into concrete or brick.

Mallet: Has rubber, plastic, wooden or rawhide

head and is used to drive chisels or hammer joints together. These are used where a metal hammer might damage a surface and are available in a variety of shapes and sizes for specific tasks.

Specialty Hammers

Soft-Face Hammer: Used for assembling furniture, setting dowels and wood projects that require nonmarring blows. Most feature a soft and hard replaceable head.

Bricklayer's Hammer: Used for setting or splitting bricks and for chipping mortar from bricks. They feature a curved, chisel-like pick and a small, square striking surface.

Shingler's Hammer: Drives roofing nails, assures proper shingle spacing, and trims composition and fiberglass shingles.

Drywall Hammer: Used to score, sheet and set nails for drywall work. Features a scored head and a notched blade instead of a claw; the notch in the blade removes exposed nails.

Basic Hammer Wielding

- Hold the hammer firmly, as far away from the head as you can hold it and still have a good arip.
- For full driving power and to protect your wrists from injury, swing the hammer from your elbow.
- Keep your eye on the target while swinging and strike the target squarely.
- For safety, wear eye protection and avoid glancing blows.

When selecting a hammer, first decide what kind of hammer your job requires and the handle type. Consider if the hammer is the right weight for you, how it is balanced between the handle and the head, and how the handle itself feels in your hand. These factors are not just about the pleasure of using a well-designed hammer-if you plan to use it for hours at a time, good design will reduce fatigue and minimize strain.

Fascinating Fasteners

Many of the projects you undertake in your home require some sort of hardware or fasteners. While a lot of items you purchase, such as coat racks, shelving systems and ready-to-assemble furniture, will come with the required hardware, there are a million other projects where you may need fasteners: nuts, bolts, screws and washers. Although our vast array of hardware may appear daunting, here are the nuts and bolts of fasteners in a nutshell to get you started. Of course, our knowledgeable staff can also assist you in selecting the proper hardware for your project.

Anatomy of a Fastener

Threaded fasteners consist mainly of the head, the shoulder or neck, the shank, the thread and the point. There are a wide variety of styles and types of each of these parts.

Fastener heads fall into two types: those with a recess for driving and those designed to be held by a tool gripping the outside of the head. The profile of the head depends on the application.

* The **neck or shoulder** prevents the turning of the bolt during tightening. It may be square, ribbed, fin neck, round or oval.

* The **shank** is the unthreaded portion of the fastener.

The **thread** determines how the fastener is to be used. Some are coarse thread, others are fine thread and are divided into classes (1A, 2A, 3A and 5), each class having an application recommendation.

* The **point** of a fastener can be a variety of styles, including flat, oval, cut, dog, half-dog, machine, gimlet and nail. Each style is designed for a specific use.

Some Common Types and Features of Fasteners: **Sheet Metal Screw**

- Fastens thin metal to thin metal
- Threaded entire length
- Can have flat, oval, round or binding head
- Typical length ranging from 1/8" to 2"

Machine Screw

- Can have round, oval, flat or fillister head
- Intended to be screwed into prethreaded holes in metal
- Looks like a bolt, but is driven with a screwdriver instead of a wrench
- Sized according to diameter, thread and length

Set Screw

- Prevents bolts from loosening due to vibration
- Headless set screw tightened with a screwdriver
- Square head set screw tightened with a wrench

Wood Screw

- Used to secure wood together
- · Usually made of steel, aluminum or brass
- Threads from the point along threequarters of the length Head slotted

Dowel Screw

- Threaded on
- both ends
- · Used for assembling pieces of furniture end to end

Lag Screw

- Also called a lag bolt
- Similar to wood screw but stronger Used when increased gripping power

- Used for wrenching into wood surfaces

Drywall/Deck Screw

- · Used when installing drywall or





Searching for Perfect Pitch

Finding the correct screw or bolt to fit into a prethreaded opening can be a difficult and time-consuming job. Screws or bolts have several dimensions: length, diameter and pitch. The first two qualities are simple. How long and how big around is the bolt? But many do-it-yourselfers have never heard of "pitch," or how many threads a screw or bolt has per inch. For example, a two-inch long, 1/4-inch bolt may have a pitch of 20, 28 or another number. For such a little-known thing, pitch is

terribly important. Why? Because a screw

that is too "coarse"—or has too few threads per inch—can be forced into a hole that is too "fine"—or needs a screw with more threads per inch. Forcing too coarse a screw will strip the threads of the opening, thus causing the object to be unable to be screwed together again without taking out the stripped receiving fastener and replacing it with a new one.
